### **CALL TO ORDER:**

President Kosel called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and noted that all Directors were present.

### **ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:**

KPPCSD President, Len Welsh, asked the Board to consider lowering the rent on the public safety building to \$1 a year. He said KPPCSD is not in the best financial shape and having both agencies in the same building is synergistic to their purposes. Welsh distributed an opinion from KPPCSD's legal counsel to the Board members. He suggested that the decision did not need to be made tonight since the lease is not up until June 2014. Director Nagel asked if the \$1 request is one-time or is Welsh asking for it to continue perpetually? Welsh answered that he is asking for it continually and thinks it would be a gesture for the two Districts to recognize their worth to each other.

### RECONVENE REGULAR BOARD MEETING:

President Kosel reconvened the regular Board meeting at 7:34 p.m. She announced that no reportable action was taken during closed session.

### APPROVAL OF CONSENT ITEMS:

President Kosel called for the approval of the consent calendar (items 3, 4, 5 & 6) consisting of approval of the minutes of the February 12, 2014 meeting, approval of the monthly transmittal #9, approval of the monthly January/February 2014 financial report, and approval of the February incident activity report. President Kosel noted that a replacement transmittal #9 was presented to the Board members at the meeting that included payment for a shipment of community 24-hour emergency kits. Director Blaschczyk made a motion to accept the consent calendar items as amended. Director deVille seconded the motion.

### ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

Resident Anthony Knight believes there is a deep division between the administration of Kensington police and fire. He believes the difference is funding. Both agencies serve the same constituency and work out of the same building. One agency is in financial distress and the other agency has the ability to assist.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

A copy of the *Fire Plug* was included in the packet. Kosel asked the Outlook to include the two dates for the annual shredding event on April 5<sup>th</sup> and the pharmaceutical drop off on April 26<sup>th</sup> in its April publication.

### **CHIEF'S REPORT:**

Chief Maples gave an overview of the Fire Prevention Division's activities in 2013. The Fire Prevention Division is staffed by Fire Prevention Officer David Ciappara and Fire Marshal Michael Bond. The division processed over 500 engine company inspections, 43 plan reviews and 30 construction site visits. Our certified car seat installers installed 70 car seats in 2013 by appointment and at open houses. CPR and First Aid was taught to 60

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students. Non-compliant weed abatement notices were sent to 175 properties and all but seven in both communities voluntarily cleared.

The City of Richmond Fire Chief, Michael Banks, will be retiring in December of this year. El Cerrito-Kensington has a tradition of partnership with Richmond Fire.

### **BOARD REPORTS:**

Education: The Fire Plug was delivered to Kensington residents this week. CSDA: Next meeting is April 21st.

**ADJOURNMENT:** The meeting was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.



### Diablo Firesafe Partnership

As the fire season approaches, I want to take a moment to reflect on the partnership that has been created between Kensington and the Diablo Firesafe Council. Staff from the Fire Department, Diablo Firesafe Council, and the citizens of Kensington have worked hand in hand with East Bay Regional Parks to expand the fuel reduction corridor in between Wildcat Canyon Regional Park in the community of Kensington. Over the past few years, the following areas have received defensible space grants through Diablo Firesafe. The following is a list of the grants:

### 2010-11

Lake Drive - \$5,000 Los Alto Drive - \$5,000 Purdue Ave. - \$5,000 Canon & Plateau Drive - \$5,000 Kensington Court - \$5,000 Beloit Ave. - \$5,000

### 2013-14

Lake Drive - \$3,000 Los Alto Drive - \$3,000 Purdue Ave. - \$3,000 Canon & Plateau Drive - \$3,000 Kensington Court - \$3,000 Beloit Ave. - \$3,000

It's these type of partnership grants that have really assisted in bringing the community together to work in fuel reduction projects. As we move into the future, we will continue to support Diablo Firesafe and assist them in any way possible as they use creative strategies to apply for grants that will benefit our community. It should also be noted that during the aforementioned time period, four grants were also received in El Cerrito totaling \$16,000. We look forward to strengthening these relationships that make our community a safer place to live. Please see the attached success story about one of the projects here in Kensington.

# More Elves in Kensington

Kensington woodland elves live to work wildlands. The results of their labors can be seen in the 1.72 mile interface between homes in the unincorporated Contra Costa County town of Kensington, California (pop. 4,936) and the wildlands of Wildcat Canyon. Their mission is to lower the height and break up the continuity of fuels to reduce wildfire hazards.

The Kensington Fuel Reduction Project began in March 2008, when Diablo FireSafe Council (DFSC) submitted a grant application to Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E). The \$15,000 was used to manage flammable vegetation behind 30 homes along Lake Drive, Los Altos Drive and Canon Drive at the top of the western slopes of Wildcat Canyon Regional Park.

To enable the homeowners to work on parklands, DFSC created a Right of Entry agreement with the East Bay Regional Park District. The agreement was the first of its kind between the District and residents. It formalizes a working relationship that is also supported by the Kensington Fire Protection District and El Cerrito Fire Department. The agreement has been renewed for 2012.

By 2010 the PG&E funds had been spent. But the work expanded with neighbor volunteer labor augmented by funding provided by a National Fire Plan grant from the USDA Forest Service through the California Fire Safe Council. Six different coordinators orchestrated fuel management from Canon Drive to Kensington Court. They pruned lower limbs and cut brush below trees to eliminate "ladder fuels" that could carry a wildfire up into trees and nearby homes. Contractors were hired to complete work too difficult for homeowners to undertake. Once materials were cut it was chipped, with chips spread to reduce weed growth.

Additional support has been received from PG&E and the work continues in 2012.



At the January 27th, 2014 chapter meeting Bette Boatmun was re-elected to serve as Chair (President) for another two year term.


Sharyn Rossi was elected to serve as Vice President and also appointed Treasurer. Stan Caldwell was elected to serve another term as Member at Large.

# Creating Wetlands: 3-year project will benefit wildlife and ISD ratepayers

The state Department of Water Resources, Reclamation District 830 (which maintains the levee protecting Jersey Island), and Ironhouse Sanitary District (ISD) have entered into agreements to transport up to 600,000 cubic yards of dirt from approximately 100 acres of ISD property to a habitat restoration project a couple of miles away on the other side of Marsh Creek.

The project will result in a benefit to the district of about \$2.5 million via the sale of the dirt. The total DWR grant is just under \$9 million. "This project will be a great deal for ISD ratepayers," General Manager Tom Williams said. "We'll be able to use this money to offset future district fees."

The Marsh Creek Delta Habitat Enhancement Project will use the dirt to raise the elevation of part of the Dutch Slough Restoration project (across Marsh Creek) that has been deteriorating over the last 100 years. By raising elevations, additional tidal marshes and upland areas can be created, improving the habitat value of the restoration project.

More than 100 years ago, small manmade levees were placed around shallow tidal lands so farmers could keep the Delta waters out and grow crops. While that sounds harmless, unfortunately the loss of the important tidal areas that filter storm water and protect against storm surges, combined with decades of land subsidence, have resulted in tall levees, and substantially less protective coastal areas.


The project will also create about 90 acres of wetland and tidal marsh habitat at the site where the dirt is to be removed. The project is estimated to take three years to complete, with relocation of most or all dirt happening in 2016.

"This project is a win-win-win-win situation," Williams said. "The local environment gets 200-300 acres of additional habitat, ISD gets money to offset rates, the Delta levee districts meet program mandates for habitat enhancement, the community gets additional open space areas to enjoy, flood protection is improved, and the list goes on. It's a fantastic opportunity that allows our district to do these great things, while bringing in money over the next four years that doesn't come from the ratepayer."

Once the new wetlands habitat is built RD-830 will maintain the habitat for five years. During that time, the goal is to develop a self-sustaining natural area that is appealing to native fish species, migrating birds, and other wildlife that frequent the area. In addition, ISD hopes to use the project to encourage educational opportunities related to Delta habitats, species, biology and science.

# ISD Honored for Outstanding Public Outreach

Ironhouse Sanitary District (ISD) received a special award from the California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CASA) for Public Outreach and Education at the association's annual conference in August 2013.



ISD received the award for its "Lighting Your Way to Proper FOG Recycling" program, which launched in late 2011 to encourage residents to not pour household fats, oils and grease down the drain, but rather recycle their FOG at the district's drop-off site so that it can be reused as bio-diesel fuel.

The award-winning campaign included advertising on the district's website, signage, social media and media coverage. Bay Area and Sacramento area news stations covered the district's Saturday FOG drop-off days that encouraged residents to bring in their used turkey fryer oil and holiday cooking grease.

Tapping into the reuse angle of turning the FOG into biodiesel also caught the attention of "green" bloggers, garnering a "Weekend Warrior" award for providing the service.

This is the second major CASA award for ISD, which in 2011 was also recognized for technological innovation and achievement for the new Water Recycling Facility.

# Growing a Healthy Community One Garden at a Time

"Los Medanos Community Healthcare District (LMCHD) had some vacant property and it came to me that a community garden would be a great idea," said LMCHD board member and Community Garden chair, Marilyn Condit. "I wanted something that would benefit the community and also a way to utilize the property to make it beautiful. Gardens help build community and promote healthy eating."

The garden got started six years ago; LMCHD broke ground on the community garden. It took four years for LMCHD to raise the money, rally community interest, and for the city of Pittsburg to really embrace the idea. LMCHD hired landscape architect Joel Summerhill, who was a former employee of the City of Pittsburg. Bobbi Palmer, CEO of The District said "We ended up working with a group of high-risk teenagers who actually helped to build the garden. STS Academy provided a valuable community service for Pittsburg and the teenagers were a huge help! The District bears the cost of keeping the garden thriving, while the gardeners do the hard work.

The community garden consists of 39 ground plots, 18 raised beds, and 23 circle plots. They run at maximize capacity and maintain a wait list. Linda Strong, LMCHD board president and co-chair of the Community Garden stated "the garden is absolutely beautiful. Great vegetables are grown in our organic garden and it's really exciting to support our residents with access to fresh vegetables in such a practical way."

Garden plots are intended for the organic growth of edible fruits, vegetables, and herbs. Annual flowers may be included. Gardeners are expected to participate in garden work days to help with maintenance and harvesting of community plots. Steve, a Pittsburg resident, is the unofficial Mayor of the community garden and is a constant presence in the garden. He serves as

official greeter and coach for new gardeners. He is passionate about vegetables and stated, "We know what we grow, and it's all natural."

The community plots are ground plots that the gardeners use to grow fruits and vegetables that benefit our "neighbors across the street." All the fruits and vegetables are picked, bagged and donated to Loaves and Fishes and food pantries within our community.

Individuals or organizations who want a garden plot attend a community garden meeting and complete the registration process. Plots are available on a first come, first serve basis.

To join the Community Garden a person must be a resident of Pittsburg or Bay Point and pay an annual membership of \$20.00. The District provides water, tools, and some seeds for garden use.

# Discovery Bay: Renovated community center opens




The New Year will be a new start for this town's community center.

# **LAFCO Update**



The Commission also plans to initiate a second round MSR covering fire and emergency medical services in 2014.


