
Incident Activity Reports for the Month of May

WHEREAS, the information used in the determination of the calculation of the appropriations limit has been available for public inspection for at least 15 days;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Kensington Fire Protection District establishes the appropriations limit for Fiscal Year 2011-2012 as \$3,246,400.

Article XIIIB of the California Constitution specifies that local jurisdictions select their cost-of-living factor to compute their appropriations limit by a vote of the governing body. Historically, the Kensington Fire Protection District has selected the following method of computing its limit.

Decrease in California per capita personal income = 2.51%

Population change in Contra Costa County = 0.77%

Per capita converted to a ratio: (2.51 + 100)/100 = 1.0251

Population converted to a ratio: (0.77 + 100)/100 = 1.0077

Calculation of factor for FY 2011-2012: $1.0251 \times 1.0077 = 1.0329$

Appropriations limit for FY 20109-2011: \$3,143,000

Calculated appropriations limit for FY 2011-2012: $\$3,143,000 \times 1.0329 = \$3,246,405$

Suggested appropriations limit: \$3,246,400

NFPA Announces This Year's Theme for Fire Prevention Week 2011

What's the best way to protect your family from fire? Be ahead of the game, of course. With more than 360,000 home fires reported in the United States in 2009, according to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), your best defense is a good offense. "Protect your Family from Fire!" This year's campaign focuses on preventing the leading causes of home fires -- cooking, heating and electrical equipment, as well as candles and smoking materials. Additionally, it urges people to protect their homes and families with life-saving technology and planning.

"In 2009, 2,565 people died in home fires. Nearly all of these deaths could have been prevented by taking a few simple precautions like having working smoke alarms and a home fire escape plan, keeping things that can burn away from the stove and always turning off space heaters before going to bed.

NFPA offers the following tips for protecting your home and family from fire:

- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Replace or repair damaged or loose electrical cords.
- If you smoke, smoke outside.
- Use deep, wide ashtrays on a sturdy table.
- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.

While preventing structure fires is always our number one priority, it is not always possible. Residents need to provide the best protection to keep their homes and families safe in the event of a fire. This can be achieved by developing an escape plan which you practice regularly and equipping homes with lifesaving technologies like smoke alarms and home fire sprinklers.

The following tips will help keep your family safe if there is a fire in your home:

- Install smoke alarms inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home (including the basement).
- Interconnect all smoke alarms in the home so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Test smoke alarms at least monthly and replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond when tested.
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to respond if the smoke alarm sounds.

BACKGROUND

The Fire Department has continued its annual fire hazard abatement program through the winter months to reduce a likely insect infestation into the eucalyptus trees being abated. This program seeks to remove weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material from private properties where such flammable material endangers the public safety by creating a public nuisance and a fire hazard. Specifically, this action targets unhealthy and dead or dying eucalyptus trees and dead branches within the trees and ladder fuels growing into the trees. Most of the property owners voluntarily abate these hazards without Fire Department abatement action. Ideally 100% of the property owners will do so. The Fire Department continues to work with the property owners resolve this issue without abatement. Any property owners that do not comply will have the District do the work and place the costs on their tax bill.

The El Cerrito-Kensington Fire Department has been working with property owners in both El Cerrito and Kensington regarding a stand of eucalyptus trees surrounding the property located at 820 Bates Ave. There are over 100 eucalyptus trees involved in this process with the vast majority of the trees being co-owned as they are growing on the property lines. The Kensington Fire Protection District is involved only when the owners of the trees have shared property lines as well as shared property lines that also split jurisdictional boundaries. (i.e., the Kensington/El Cerrito jurisdictional boundary line is the same as the property line splitting 34 Lam Court, Kensington and 820 Bates Ave., El Cerrito).

These particular properties are being declared a public nuisance and will have abatement ordered by both the Kensington Fire Protection District and the City of El Cerrito simultaneously. If abatement actions are required, the abatement will be conducted in a coordinated effort through each jurisdiction.

ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

The Fire Hazard Abatement process under the direction of the Fire Department should proceed according to Health and Safety Code Sections 14875 et seq which specify the following:

The El Cerrito Fire Department on behalf of the Kensington Fire Protection District has
determined hazards that must be abated. Pursuant to these code sections, hazards are defined
as weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable materials such as eucalyptus trees, dead and
dying tree branches or leaves and bark which create a fire hazard or are otherwise noxious or
dangerous and which exist on specific parcels of property within the boundaries of the
District.

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- 2. Notice was sent by mail that the Fire District has determined the existence of a public nuisance which must be abated and that a hearing will be held to consider any objections prior to ordering the Fire Chief or his designee to perform abatement.
- 3. At the June 8, 2011 meeting, the Board of Directors shall hear and consider all objections to the proposed removal of weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board of Directors shall by resolution allow or overrule any objections and order the Fire Chief or his designee to abate some or all of the public nuisance conditions on any remaining parcels which have not been voluntarily cleared by that time. The costs for abatement shall be assessed against the property as a lien and special assessment.
- 4. At the conclusion of the June 8, 2011 hearing a second and final notice shall be sent to each property owner prior to abatement. This notice will order the immediate abatement of nuisance conditions. This notice will clearly state that if nuisance conditions are ignored, the Fire District shall cause abatement and costs for removal will be assessed against the property as a lien and special assessment. It will also indicate that if the conditions are voluntarily abated, the property shall be removed from the process.
- 5. Sometime between June 13, 2011 and June 30, 2011, if the hazardous conditions are not removed prior to the arrival of the hazard abatement crew, the Kensington Fire Protection District shall cause the weeds, rubbish, refuse, and other flammable material to be removed and shall keep an account of the cost of abatement for each parcel or land where such work is performed.
- 6. After July 31, 2011 the Fire Chief or his designee shall submit to the Board of Directors of the Fire District for confirmation an itemized written report showing the cost of abatement work performed. A copy of this report shall be posted for at least three days prior to its submission to the Board of Directors. Each property owner upon whose property abatement work was performed shall be sent written notice by mail of a hearing by the Board of Directors to consider the cost of abatement work performed on their property.
- 7. At the Board meeting on August 10, 2011 the Board of Directors of the Fire District shall receive and consider the written staff report on abatement actions taken by the District and shall hear any objections from the property owners liable to be assessed for the abatement. The Board of Directors may modify the staff report if deemed appropriate and then confirm the report by motion or resolution.
- 8. After Board of Directors confirmation of the report, a certified copy of the report shall be filed with the county auditor who shall add the amount of the assessment to the next regular tax bill levied against the parcel.

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FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The abatement program will be administered by Fire Department staff with minimum costs expended for printing and mailing. Abatement work will be completed by private contract labor as appropriate. Program costs will be recovered through the special assessment and lien process.

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

The properties were evaluated to determine whether or not a conflict of interest arose with any individual Board Member by being within 500 feet of any Board Member's property. There was no conflict.

The Fire District's Attorney has reviewed and approved the process.

The Fire Hazard Abatement Program is exempt from California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to sections 15304 and 15308 or the CEQA Guidelines. Therefore, no further CEQA review is required.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Kensington Fire Protection District authorize through the adoption of Resolution 11-04 the initiation of the abatement process by declaring weeds, rubbish, litter, and other flammable material such as eucalyptus trees, dead and dying tree branches or leaves and bark on specific parcels of property within District boundaries as public nuisances, which must be abated.

RESOLUTION 11-04

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DECLARING THAT WEEDS, RUBBISH, LITTER OR OTHER FLAMMABLE MATERIAL ON DESIGNATED PRIVATE PROPERTIES CONSTITUTES A PUBLIC NUISANCE AND PROVIDING FOR NOTICE THAT THE FIRE CHIEF OR DESIGNEE SHALL ABATE SUCH PUBLIC NUISANCE CONDITIONS IF NOT ABATED BY THE PROPERTY OWNER.

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Sections 14875 et seq provides a method by which a local legislative body may abate on private property public nuisance conditions relating to weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material such as eucalyptus trees, dead and dying tree branches or leaves and bark which creates a fire hazard, a menace to the public health or which is otherwise noxious or dangerous; and

WHEREAS, the Fire Marshal for the Kensington Fire Protection District has identified in Exhibit A to this resolution those private properties, by street name, lot and block number, on which the presence of eucalyptus trees, dead and dying tree branches or leaves and bark or other flammable material, as defined in Health and Safety Code Section 14875, constitute a public nuisance; and

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Sections 14890 through 14899 provide that notice shall be provided to each person to whom the properties identified in Exhibit A is assessed informing those persons that unless the property owner abates those nuisance conditions, that the Fire District shall abate the public nuisance. The notice shall further state that if the Fire District must abate the public nuisance, then the cost of abatement shall be assessed against the property as a special assessment. The notice shall also specify a date for a hearing at which property owners may present objections to the designation of their properties as public nuisances or to the proposed removal of the fire hazards by the Fire District; and

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Section 14900 provides that after the hearing, the local legislative body may, by motion or resolution, order the Fire Chief or designee to abate the public nuisance. After further proceedings, these abatement costs may be assessed against the property as a special assessment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Kensington Fire Protection District that the properties listed in Exhibit A to this resolution are declared a public nuisance and such nuisance conditions shall be ordered abated because the presence of weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material such as eucalyptus trees, dead and dying tree branches or leaves and bark on those properties create a fire hazard, a menace to the public health or are otherwise noxious or dangerous.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the notice shall state that a public hearing shall be held on June 8, 2011 at 7:30 p.m. at the Kensington Community Center located at 59 Arlington Avenue, Kensington, California. At this hearing, objections shall be heard from those persons to whom those properties identified in Exhibit A are assessed.

Fire Hazard Reduction Program The Kensington Fire Protection District

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Purpose of Vegetation Management Standards

Along with California's growth of population and expanding development, urban housing has intermixed with wildland areas. California communities have experienced devastating fire loss because of the severity of fires which occur in this intermix area. The risk of conflagration in the intermix is increased further by homeowners who create uncontrolled landscaping of native and non-native plants on their properties. Thousands of homes are threatened by fire every year in California largely because of this heavy vegetation fuel load very near structures.

Almost the entire community of Kensington is considered to be a wildland intermix area which increases the community's risk of loss from devastating fire. This area has been identified by the California Department of Forestry (CDF) and the Kensington Fire Protection District as Very High Fire Hazard Severity (VHFHS) zone. As specified by State law (AB 337), property owners within this zone must take special precautions with their property, including vegetation management, to reduce the risk of fire.

The buildup of unmanaged vegetation, whether native or non-native, steep hillsides with canyons and draws, and periods of extremely hot, dry weather all combine to create in Kensington the potential for catastrophic fire behavior such as occurred in the Oakland/ Berkeley Hills Fire of October 1991. Catastrophic fires can destroy large numbers of homes, threaten public safety and severely damage the natural areas which contribute to our high quality of living.

A key goal of local community fire protection planning is to reduce the level of fire hazards in the Kensington wildland intermix area, designated as a VHFHS zone. While it is not possible to eliminate all threats of catastrophic wildfire, fire hazards can be reduced to acceptable levels and still allow a "green" Kensington.

Vegetation management planning in the VHFHS zone focuses on areas where fire poses the greatest risk to life and property. There are three specific goals of the program:

- 1. Keep all fires small. Small fires generally are cooler than large fires and are more easily extinguished.
- 2. Limit the speed with which any fire will grow. Fires need fuel to burn; if fuel is available, fires will continue to grow rapidly. Fuel must be limited or made unavailable to spreading fire.
- 3. Make it more difficult for fires to ignite and spread. Small fires can ignite progressively larger fuels. Small fuels are like kindling and are easily ignited. Reducing kindling fuels, and separating kindling fuels from larger fuels reduces sources for ignition and the potential for fire spread.

Fires will continue to be a part of California urban living. By implementing vegetation management standards, Kensington residents can significantly reduce the potential that a small fire will grow into a catastrophic event involving one or more structures. The primary method of stopping fire spread is by increasing separation distances between combustible fuels. An important component of reducing the community's fire risk requires vegetation management to be practiced by property owners.

B. Fire Safe Vegetation Management Concepts

There are three basic methods employed to manage vegetation fuels: firebreaks, fuel breaks and ornamental landscaping. A <u>firebreak</u> eliminates all flammable vegetation and combustible growth. Appropriate ornamental landscaping is acceptable in this area. A <u>fuel break</u> reduces the fuel mass of

flammable vegetation and combustible growth, thereby limiting the intensity of fire and slowing its rate of spread. Ornamental landscaping provides a yard or garden with decorative fire resistive plants that are irrigated, maintained and arranged to be aesthetically pleasing, functionally useful and enhance fire safety. Refer to the definitions listed for these terms.

Within the VHFHS zone, structures are to be protected from wildfire by creating firebreaks immediately surrounding structures and fuel breaks further out from structures. Within 30 feet of a structure a <u>firebreak</u> should be created which contains well-irrigated, maintained and appropriately spaced ornamental landscaping with fire resistant plants. All flammable vegetation and combustible growth in this area immediately surrounding a structure should be eliminated. This creates a safety margin of defensible space so that wildfire can be stopped before it reaches a structure.

A <u>fuel break</u> should be created from 30 feet to 100 feet from structures located within the VHFHS zone. The heightened risk of wildfire within the VHFHS zone makes it necessary to provide an added safety margin of defensible space for all structures and a fuel break will provide this extra protection. Fuel breaks are meant to reduce fire hazardous vegetation and maintain it to specified heights and arrangements, limiting fire intensity and impeding fire spread. The purpose of the fuel break is to deny any hot fire entering it sufficient fuel to sustain fire intensity and speed. By the time it reaches the firebreak area containing ornamental landscaping nearer the structure, the now low-intensity fire should be stopped easily by the firebreak surrounding the structure.

Ornamental landscaping with fire resistant plants is encouraged as a long term approach to maintain yard and garden vegetation in a fire safe manner. Landscaping with healthy, appropriately irrigated plants and ground cover provides a permanent reduction of the fire hazard adjacent to structures when maintained at regular intervals. Ornamental landscaping can enhance a firebreak by inhibiting the growth of weeds, grass, brush and similar fire hazardous vegetation. A list of fire resistant and highly flammable plants is available from the Fire District.

C. Process

No person shall be prosecuted criminally under the provisions of Section 4 of the Kensington Fire Protection District Ordinance 95-1 until that person has received written notice of how that property violates these standards and until that person has had the reasonable opportunity to meet with District staff concerning the violation. Civil enforcement of these guidelines as provided for in Section 5 of Ordinance 95-1, pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Section 14912 et. seq. Civil procedures for fire hazard abatement include providing the property owner with (1) written notice on how the property violates these guidelines, (2) reasonable opportunity to meet with District staff to discuss this matter and (3) opportunity to be heard before the Board of Directors of the Kensington Fire Protection District.

II. FIRE HAZARD REDUCTION GUIDELINES

Many factors combine to create a fire hazard on any specific property. It is difficult to single out a specific vegetation species or configuration to declare it either fire hazardous or completely fire safe in all situations. The Fire District has developed guidelines conforming to State Law and national fire protection standards which address most situations found on private property within Kensington. Please read these guidelines along with the accompanying glossary. If you are still unsure of how to proceed, please call the Fire Department and we will work with you to develop a fire hazard reduction plan for your property.

A. Hazard Zones

Almost the entire area of the community of Kensington lies adjacent or near to a large wildland area containing steep slopes and naturally growing trees, brush and grasses. Every year under certain critical weather conditions, the neighborhoods of Kensington are at heightened risk of seasonal wildfire

sweeping into the residential areas and burning homes. The area of Kensington at heightened risk of wildfire has been designated as a Very High Fire Hazard Severity (VHFHS) zone. The small area remaining in Kensington faces a lesser risk of wildfire.

Fire hazard reduction measures common to the entire community of Kensington are required on both vacant and developed lots:

- 1. Property owners must ensure that all vegetation, native or non-native, shall be maintained so as not to constitute a fire hazard.
- 2. Property owners must maintain their property either by ornamental landscaping or by establishing a <u>fuel break</u> along the property line and adjacent to structures. For properties within the VHFHS zone, there are additional requirements for <u>firebreaks</u> within 30 feet of structures and <u>fuel breaks</u> from 30 to 100 feet.
- 3. Property owners are responsible for clearance and maintenance of their own property only. Property owners will be required, however, to create fuel breaks on their property to protect neighboring structures. Dimensions of fuel breaks will depend on the proximity of neighboring structures and on whether the properties are within the VHFHS zone.
- 4. All brush, weeds, grass, and fire hazardous vegetation within 10 feet of any usable road surface, public way or combustible fence shall be maintained in a non-hazardous condition with a <u>fuel</u> break.
- 5. Property owners must maintain their property free from all nuisances, including debris, garbage, rubbish and trash, hazardous materials, junk and noxious growth.

B. Ornamental Landscaping

Ornamental landscaping is encouraged throughout the community of Kensington to enhance fire safety. Ornamental landscaping consists of decorative plants growing within a tended garden or yard which are well-watered, maintained and located to provide aesthetic decoration and functional utility, such as privacy screening, shade, weed suppression and erosion control.

Within the VHFHS zone, ornamental landscaping in the 30 foot firebreak adjacent to structures must meet the following requirements:

- 1. Ornamental landscaping shall be maintained free of dead wood and litter, and trimmed of small twigs and branches at least two (2) feet or 1/3 of their height from the ground, whichever is less.
- 2. Ornamental landscaping must be healthy, pruned, adequately irrigated and regularly maintained so that plants and the area beneath them are free from dead or dying material.
 - 3. Single specimen trees must be trimmed and maintained.
- 4. Ground cover may be used as part of ornamental landscaping provided it is kept green, free of dead wood and litter, and at a height so that they do not form a means of rapidly transmitting fire from native growth (located outside the firebreak) to any building or structure.

C. Vegetation Management Standards

Vegetation management standards exist for the entire community, including the area designated as a VHFHS zone. Refer to the glossary for a definition of terms used in these standards.

1. Properties within the VHFHS zone:

a. Firebreaks must be created and maintained in areas within 30 feet of any occupied

dwelling.

b. Fuel Breaks must be created and maintained in areas extending from 30 to 100 feet

surrounding

c. <u>Fuel Breaks</u> must be created and maintained on vacant lots <u>30 feet wide along the property</u> <u>line</u> and <u>100 feet from neighboring structures</u>.

2. Properties outside the VHFHS zone:

- a. Fuel Breaks must be created and maintained in areas within 30 feet of any structure.
- b. Fuel Breaks must be created and maintained on vacant lots to be 10 feet wide along the property line.

3. Vegetation Management Standards for Firebreaks:

- a. All flammable vegetation or combustible growth must be removed and cleared away, thereby eliminating fire hazardous vegetation fuels which can rapidly transmit fire.
- b. Adequately irrigated and maintained ornamental landscaping is not flammable vegetation or combustible growth, and is encouraged within a firebreak.
- c. Trees, shrubs, bushes or other vegetation adjacent to or overhanging any structure shall be maintained free of dead limbs and other combustible matter such as vines and loose papery bark. On mature trees, limbs should be removed up to 10' above the ground. Smaller trees should be limbed to 1/3rd of their height up to 6' above the ground, but in no case less than 18 inches from the ground.
- d. Trees shall be maintained so that no portion is closer than 10 feet from any chimney opening.
- e. All roof surfaces shall be maintained free of substantial accumulations of needles, twigs, and any other combustible matter.
- f. All cut vegetation and debris must be disposed of either by hauling and dumping in a tawful manner, or by chipping and dispersing over the property in a manner and to a height which will not constitute a fire hazard.
- g. Chipped materials which are spread on the ground shall be of a size no greater than 1 inch by 1 inch by 3 inches.

4. Vegetation Management Standards for Fuel Breaks:

- a. Maintain ornamental landscaping in yards.
- b. All fire hazardous vegetation with the exception of weeds and grass shall be cleared and maintained to a height no greater than 18 inches above the ground.
- c. All weeds and grass shall be cleared and maintained at a height no greater than 6 inches above the ground.
 - d. Remove from trees all vines, loose papery bark and dead branches.

- e. All cut vegetation and debris must be disposed of either by hauling and dumping in a lawful manner, or by chipping and dispersing over the property in a manner and to a height which will not constitute a fire hazard.
- f. Chipped materials which are spread on the ground shall be of a size no greater than 1 inch by 1 inch by 3 inches.

5. Additional Considerations for Vegetation Management:

- a. The Fire Hazard Abatement Program is intended to promote community fire safety by reducing the combustible vegetation fuel mass on private properties. Clearing vegetation by heavy construction methods, such as grading, discing, trenching or dozing shall require special permits from the County. **Disposal by burning is not permitted.**
- b. Any parcel where slope stability will be threatened by removal of plants may be exempt from treatment requirements or subject to alternate treatments. The property owner must submit a report documenting the probability of slope failure due to vegetation removal, prepared by a licensed civil, geotechnical, or soils engineer. The report shall propose alternative treatment methods to address fire hazards. The report will be reviewed by staff. Review and acceptance by the district of alternative treatment will supersede other requirements.
- c. Any parcel or lot which includes plant or animal species that are rare, endangered or of special concern may qualify for alternative plant treatment and spacing requirements. The property owner must submit a report from a qualified resource biologist or landscape architect describing the species, actions required to preserve. The report will be reviewed by the district. Review and acceptance by the district of alternative treatment will supersede other requirements.

D. Planting Considerations

Any plant will burn if the conditions are right. Some plants are considered to be extremely flammable while other plants are considered to have some resistance to fire. Verifiable tests of fire exposure characteristics for all specific ornamental landscaping plants is not available.

The best available plant information is contained in a publication available from EBMUD entitled "Firescape: Landscaping to Reduce Fire Hazard". A list of plants with some fire-resistance and plants considered highly flammable is available from the fire district.

At the base of trees and shrubs, replace flammable vegetation with bark, mulch, rock, gravel or low-growing or more fire-resistant ground covers. This cover reduces the fire danger and minimizes weeds. Avoid placing medium-sized shrubs beneath trees or taller shrubs. By breaking up the available fuel mass in ornamental landscaping, a fire will be kept at lower intensity, flame lengths will be shorter and fire will be less likely to form a continuous line or front.

E. Structural Fire Safety

The District's roofing and vegetation management standards are designed to reduce the amount of airborne burning material, limiting fire spread. Once a fire starts, it is often accelerated by wind-borne burning material. Burning embers or brands are the main source of fire spread in mixed urban-wildland areas. The roof of a house is most vulnerable to this type of ignition. Spark arresters with a maximum of 1/2" openings in the mesh are required over the outlet of every chimney. Class A is the top rating for fire resistive roofing, followed by Classes B and C. State law and District Ordinance requires that all roofing within the VHFHS zone be Class B or better in new construction or replacement of more than 50 % of the roof.

III. GLOSSARY OF TERMS

The following terms are used to describe the vegetation management standards in California State Law and in the Kensington Fire Protection District's Fire Hazard Reduction Program.

Very High Fire Hazard Severity (VHFHS) Zones: Any geographic area designated per Government Code section 51178 to contain the type and condition of vegetation, topography, weather and structure density to potentially increase the possibility of wildland conflagration fires. As a community adjacent to extensive wildland areas, almost the entire community of Kensington is designated as a VHFHS zone. A map of this zone is available from the Fire District. Fire hazard reduction standards are more extensive for properties located within the VHFHS zone.

Defensible space: A concept in landscape design for homes which provides a band of managed vegetation around a home that slows movement of fire by reducing or denying fuel and provides a space for fire fighters to take a stand to protect the house.

Fire resistant plants: A relative term used to describe plants that are "more resistant" or "less resistant" than other plants to fire. Given enough heat, <u>all</u> vegetation will burn. Yet plants in fact differ in how fast they burn, how high a flame they produce and their ability to survive fire. Fire resistance is enhanced by higher amounts of moisture within twigs and foliage. Fire-resistant plants can lose this quality altogether if not properly maintained and irrigated. A partial list of fire resistant and highly flammable plants is available from EBMUD (232-5051) and the Fire District.

Fire hazardous vegetation: Plants which can burn easily because they generate dry undergrowth, contain flammable oils or produce significant quantities of dead or dying material. Hazardous vegetation is fuel which must be removed or strictly maintained so as not to constitute a fire hazard by igniting easily and then contributing to rapid fire spread. Seasonally dry grass, weeds, brush, and unmaintained and unirrigated trees and ornamental vegetation are examples of fire hazardous vegetation. Properly chipped, mulched and disbursed material does not constitute fire hazardous vegetation. Fire hazardous vegetation is also known as flammable vegetation and combustible growth.

Ornamental landscaping: Decorative plants growing within a tended garden or yard which are appropriately irrigated, maintained and located to provide aesthetic decoration and functional utility, such as privacy screening, shade, weed suppression and erosion control. The use of fire-resistant plants and the removal of fire hazardous vegetation will enhance fire safety.

Firebreak: An area in which all flammable vegetation or combustible growth is removed and cleared away, thereby <u>eliminating</u> fire hazardous vegetation fuels which can rapidly transmit fire. Ornamental landscaping is permissible within a firebreak as long as it is adequately irrigated, maintained and spaced so as not to provide a means of rapidly transmitting fire. Compare to **fuel break**.

Fuel break: An area in which all flammable vegetation or combustible growth is reduced and cleared away according to established standards, thereby <u>limiting</u> the mass and arrangement of fire hazardous vegetation fuels which can rapidly transmit fire. Appropriate ornamental landscaping is permissible within a fuel break. Fuel reduction standards for fuel breaks limit the height of certain vegetation (brush, native shrubs, weeds and grasses), remove from trees any fuels which can ladder fire into the canopies, and provide adequate spacing between remaining plants. Compare to firebreak.

Fire Department Mission

The Fire Department's mission is to enhance community safety by: reducing the loss of life and property while safeguarding the environment by effectively responding to fire, rescue, and medical emergencies, hazardous material incidents, and major disasters; helping members of the community reduce the frequency and severity of these emergencies by providing public education programs; reducing threats to public safety by enforcing laws, codes, and ordinances covering fire and life safety, and by abating identified fire hazards on City, private, and other agencies' property; and maintaining personnel, apparatus, equipment, and facilities in a constantly ready condition

Department Overview

The Fire Department's primary responsibility is to provide a full range of fire prevention, fire suppression and advanced emergency services. In order to reduce the impact of fire-related losses in our community and to render timely and appropriate advanced medical aid to the sick and injured, the Fire Department's number one goal is to keep the citizens of El Cerrito and Kensington as safe as possible while developing and maintaining cost effective programs that serve our communities.

The Department is able to provide a timely and appropriate level of response through active partnerships with the Richmond Fire Department and the Contra Costa County Fire Protection District through the use of automatic aid response agreements that use the combined resources of all three agencies to serve the area irrespective of jurisdictional lines. Department personnel also assist when requested through the use of the State's Master Mutual Aid Program and can be sent all over the western states to assist others in need. The City also has a contract to provide the Kensington Fire Protection District with fire protection services, which increases the level of service that can be offered to both communities. All of the aforementioned departments participate in the cost sharing of dispatch and training services. Meeting common staffing, training, apparatus, and performance standards ensures reciprocity of services.

Organizational Structure

The Fire Department's resources are concentrated in four program areas: Prevention, Training/EMS, Operations and Support Services. Fire Administration provides management oversight to these four divisions.

Fire Prevention Division

The Department utilizes a line Battalion Chief as Fire Marshal to oversee the Fire Prevention Division. The full fire prevention program includes development, interpretation, and enforcement of codes, review of construction plans, testing of fire protection systems, abatement of identified hazards, and educational programs for the public. A key component of this effort is vegetation management on City, private, and other public lands to minimize the effects of a wildland/urban interface fire and resulting structural conflagration. A Fire Prevention Officer provides code enforcement, specialized inspections, and coordination of the Department's line and staff prevention duties.

Training\ EMS Division

A significant portion of the Fire Department's resources are dedicated to the task of maintaining departmental resources in a ready state. All personnel must maintain a high skill level for an increasing range of responsibilities. Many of these skill levels must be tested and certified annually. Training is both a daily priority and a program vital to providing reliable emergency services. Complex equipment and apparatus require continual testing and training. The Training Officer also supervises and manages the Emergency Medical Programs which encompasses the training and operations of the Department's EMTs and Paramedics. The neighborhood disaster preparedness component of the Department's public education program, known as the CERT Program (Community Emergency Response Team) is also managed under this Division.

Operations Division


Emergency Operations of the Fire Department include controlling and extinguishing fires, intervention in medical emergencies which threaten life and health, and protection of life, the environment, and property from the effects of storm, flood, earthquake, disaster, hazardous chemical releases and other emergency events. A line Battalion Chief also manages this division.

Support Services Division

The Support Services Division is tasked with ensuring that all of the department facilities, apparatus and equipment are maintained in a constant state of readiness. This includes annual testing, maintenance and purchasing. This division is also in charge of the comprehensive administrative reporting system. The Department's Health and Wellness program is also managed by this division.

Based on a review of the Department activities for prior fiscal years the workload has remained relatively stable. The Fire Department will be able to meet the anticipated workload for FY 2011-12 with current staffing levels as shown in the adopted budget. **Table 6-2** lists six response types:

- 1. Fire Structure fire, fire in mobile property, wildland fire
- 2. Medical Rescue, medical assistance, vehicle accident
- 3. Hazardous Condition Toxic condition, electrical arcing, flammable gas or liquid condition
- 4. Service Call Person(s) in distress, water problem, odor problem, unauthorized burning
- 5. Good Intent Hazardous material investigation/no hazard found, EMS call/patient self transported
- 6. False Calls Unintentional alarm, system malfunction, malicious, bomb scare/no hazard

Chart 6-2 Emergency Response Workload



I would like to confirm my understanding for the services that I will be providing to Kensington Fire Protection District (KFPD) for the year ended June 30, 2011. I will audit the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, all major funds, and the aggregate remaining fund information, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements of Kensington Fire Protection District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2011. Accounting standards generally accepted in the United States provide certain required supplementary information (RSI), such as management's discussion and analysis (MD&A), to accompany Kensington Fire Protection District's basic financial statements. As part of my engagement, I will apply certain limited procedures to RSI. These limited procedures will consist principally of inquiring management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation, which the management is responsible for affirming to us in its representation letter. Unless I encounter problems with the presentation of the RSI or with the procedures relating to it, I will disclaim an opinion on it. The following RSI is required by generally accepted accounting principles, although it will be subjected to some limited procedures, it will not be audited:

1) Management's Discussion and Analysis.

Supplementary information other than RSI also accompanies KFPD's basic financial statements. I will subject the following supplementary information to the auditing procedures applied in My audit of the basic financial statements and will provide an opinion on it in relation to the basic financial statements:

1) None

Audit Objectives

The objective of My audit is the expression of opinions as to whether your basic financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles and to report on the fairness of the additional information referred to in the first paragraph when considered in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole. My audit will be conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards established by the Auditing Standards Board (United States) and the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and will include tests of the accounting records of KFPD and other procedures I consider necessary to enable us to express such opinions. If My opinions on the financial statements are other than unqualified, I will fully discuss the reasons with you in advance. If, for any reason, I are unable to complete the audit or are unable to form or have not formed opinions, I may decline to express opinions or to issue a report as a result of this engagement.

I will also provide a report (that does not include an opinion) on internal control related to the financial statements and compliance with laws, regulations, and the provisions of contracts or grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements as required by Government Auditing Standards. The report on internal control and compliance will include a statement that the report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the body or individuals charged with governance, others within the entity, and specific legislative or regulatory bodies and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties. If during My audit I become aware that KFPD is subject to an audit requirement that is not encompassed in the terms of this engagement, I will communicate to management and those charged with governance that an audit in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards and the standards for financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards may not satisfy the relevant legal, regulatory, or contractual requirements.

Management Responsibilities

Management is responsible for the basic financial statements and all accompanying information as III as all representations contained therein. As part of the audit, I will prepare a draft of your financial statements and related notes. You are responsible for making all management decisions and performing all management functions relating to the financial statements and related notes and for accepting full responsibility for such decisions. You will be required to acknowledge in the management representation letter that you have review and approved the financial statements and related notes prior to their issuance and have accepted responsibility for them. Further, you are required to designate an individual with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience to oversee any non audit services I provide and for evaluating the adequacy and results of those services and accepting responsibility for them.

Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal controls, including monitoring ongoing activities; for the selection and application of accounting principles; and for the fair presentation in the financial statements of the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the KFPD and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

Management is also responsible for making all financial records and related information available to us and for the accuracy and completeness of that information. Your responsibilities include adjusting the financial statements to correct material misstatements and for confirming to us in the representation letter that the effects of any uncorrected misstatements aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

In addition, I will secure confidentiality agreements with all service providers to maintain the confidentiality of your information and I will take reasonable precautions to determine that they have appropriate procedures in place to prevent the unauthorized release of your confidential information to others. In the event that I am unable to secure an appropriate confidentiality agreement, you will be asked to provide your consent prior to the sharing of your confidential information with the third-party service provider. Furthermore, I will remain responsible for the work provided by any such third-party service providers.

I understand that your employees will prepare all cash or other confirmations I request and will locate any documents selected by us for testing.

I will provide copies of my reports to California State Controller Office; however, management is responsible for distribution of the reports and the financial statements. Unless restricted by law or regulation, or containing privileged and confidential information, copies of my reports are to be made available for public inspection.

The audit documentation for this engagement is the property of Lamorena & Chang, CPA and constitutes confidential information. However, pursuant to authority given by law or regulation, I may be requested to make certain audit documentation available to State or Federal agency or its designee, a federal agency providing direct or indirect funding, or the U.S. Government Accountability Office for purposes of a quality review of the audit, to resolve audit findings, or to carry out oversight responsibilities. I will notify you of any such request. If requested, access to such audit documentation will be provided under the supervision of Lamorena & Chang, CPA personnel. 

RECOMMENDATION FOR ACTION

Adopt a Resolution approving and authorizing the Board President or designee, to execute the First Amended Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for Providing Public Liability and Other Self-Insurance between the County of Contra Costa and other Fire Districts within the County of Contra Costa, to take effect on July 1, 2011.

SUBJECT BACKGROUND

Currently, the District is a participant in the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement for Providing Public Liability and Other Self-Insurance (JPA) between the County of Contra Costa and other Fire Districts within the County of Contra Costa. Under the JPA the pooled resources of the participants arranges for the payment of general liability, auto liability and property losses and claims and insurance. The program is administered by the County and is funded through equitable cost sharing by the participants which currently include the County (including various special districts within the County), and seven (7) Fire Districts within the County, dependent or independent of County governance; Fiscal Year 2010-11 charges to the District amounted to \$10,737.00. The original Agreement dates back to July 1, 1988, and needs to be amended to reflect changes in the participants, claims and other procedures, and insurance coverage. It is recommended the District continue its participation in the JPA with its amendments.

JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT FOR PROVIDING

PUBLIC LIABILITY AND OTHER SELF-INSURANCE

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FIRST AMENDED JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT FOR PROVIDING PUBLIC LIABILITY AND OTHER SELF-INSURANCE

. Parties.

This First Amended Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement For Providing Public Liability and Other Self-Insurance is executed between Contra Costa County, County Fire Protection Districts in Contra Costa County (including Independent Fire Protection Districts as defined herein), Special Districts, Agencies and Commissions organized and existing under the Constitution and statutes of the State of California which are parties signatory to this Agreement. All such parties, hereinafter called "Parties," are listed Appendix A, attached hereto and incorporated herein.

2. Recitals.

- A. Article 1, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 of the California Government Code (Sections 6500 et seq.) permits two or more public agencies by agreement to exercise jointly powers common to the contracting parties; and
- B. Article 16, Section 6 of the California Constitution provides that insurance pooling arrangements under joint exercise of powers agreements shall not be considered the giving or lending of credit as prohibited therein; and
- C. California Government Code Section 990.4 provides that a local public entity may self-insure, purchase insurance through an authorized carrier or purchase insurance through a surplus line broker or any combination of these; and
- D. Pursuant to California Government Code Section 990.6, the cost of insurance. provided by a local public entity is a proper charge against the local public entity; and
- E. California Government Code Section 990.8 provides that two or more local entities may by a joint powers agreement provide insurance for any purpose by any one or more of the methods specified in Government Code Section 990.4 and such pooling of self-insurance funds for claims or losses shall not be considered insurance nor subject to regulation under the Insurance Code; and
- F. The parties executing this First Amended Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement For Providing Public Liability and Other Self-Insurance have joined together for the purpose of jointly funding a program of self-insurance for comprehensive liability, property damage and other coverages to be determined.





G. The parties now desire to amend their original Agreement to read as set forth herein.

Definitions.


- A. "Agency or Commission" means any agency or commission under the jurisdiction of the Board of Supervisors.
- B. "Agreement" means this First Amended Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement For Providing Public Liability and Other Self-Insurance.
- C. "Board" means the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors.
- D. "Claim" means a claim made either against or by a party arising out of a loss which is covered by a self-insurance program under this Agreement in which the party is a participant.
- E. "County" means Contra Costa County.
- F. "County Administrator" means the County Administrator of Contra Costa County.
- G. "Fiscal Year" means that period of 12 months which is established by the Board of Supervisors as the fiscal year.
- H. "Government Code" means the California Government Code.
- I. "Independent Fire Protection District" means a fire protection district which is not governed by the Board, but the territory of which is primarily located within Contra Costa County.
- J. "Insurance Committee" is a committee of representatives of the participants in a self-insurance program appointed pursuant to the procedures established by that program.
- K. "Joint Powers Law" means Article 1, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 (commencing with Section 6500) of the Government Code.
- L. "Loss" means a liability or potential liability of a party, including litigation expenses, attorneys' fees and other defense costs, which is covered by a self-insurance program under this Agreement.

- M. "Party" or "parties" means Contra Costa County, Independent Fire Protection
 Districts located primarily in Contra Costa County, Special Districts, Agencies
 and Commissions which are parties to this Agreement pursuant to Section 5 of
 this Agreement.
- N. "Policy Year" means for each self-insurance program under this Agreement the 12 month period beginning with the effective date of the program and each 12 month period thereafter.
- O. "Reinsurance" means insurance purchased as part of an excess program to cover that portion of any loss which exceeds the joint funding capacity of that program.
- P. "Risk Management Division" means the Risk Management Division of the Contra Costa County Administrator's Office.
- Q. "Self-insurance Program" means a program under this Agreement under which participating parties are protected against designated losses.
- R "Self-insured Retention" means that portion of a loss experience by a party which is retained as a liability or potential liability of the party and is not subject to payment under this agreement.
- S. "Special District" means a district, fire protection district, or County service area which is governed by the Board.

Purpose.

The purpose of this Agreement is to develop and fund programs of self-insurance. Such programs may include but shall not be limited to the creation of joint insurance funds, the purchase of insurance policies, the purchase of reinsurance and the acquisition of necessary administrative and legal services. Such administrative services may include but shall not be limited to risk management consulting, administrative services, loss prevention and control, centralized loss reporting, actuarial consulting, claims adjusting, administrative, and legal defense services.

All such purposes shall be accomplished through the joint exercise of powers by the parties pursuant to this Agreement or such other agreements as may be necessary to implement and carry out such purposes herein.



5. Changes in Parties to Agreement.

A. The parties are as described in Section 1, and include such parties as may be later added as parties to this Agreement pursuant to Section 15. Each party agrees that the removal of any party from this Agreement pursuant to Sections 16, 17, 18, or 24 shall not affect this Agreement with the other party(s) to the Agreement then remaining.

6. Term.

This Agreement shall become effective when executed by the County. The County Administrator shall notify all parties in writing of such effective date. This Agreement shall continue in effect until terminated as provided herein.

7. Governing Authority.

The governing authority is Board of Supervisors of Contra Costa County.

8. Powers of the County Under This Agreement.

The County shall administer this Agreement and exercise the powers common to the parties hereto as agreed to herein and all additional powers set forth in the joint powers law and is hereby authorized to do on behalf of the parties all acts necessary for the exercise of said powers, including, but not limited to the following:

- A. To make and enter into contracts;
- B. To incur debts, liabilities and obligations;
- C. To acquire, hold or dispose of property, contributions and donations of property, funds, services and other forms of assistance from persons, firms, corporations, and government entities;
- D. To sue and be sued and to settle any claims arising from this Agreement;
- E. To receive and use contributions and advances from parties as provided in Government Code Section 6504, including contributions or advances of personnel, equipment or property;
- F. To develop or cause to be developed and review, modify as necessary, and adopt each self-insurance program;



- G. To invest pursuant to Government Code Section 6509.5 any money in the County Insurance Internal Services Funds that is not immediately required to carry out the programs under this Agreement.
- H. To join other joint powers agreements or agencies to provide services or excess insurance coverage for the parties hereto.

9. <u>Insurance Committee</u>.

Insurance committees may be formed whenever deemed necessary by the parties or by the Board. The parties to a self-insurance program shall designate how representatives to its insurance committee shall be selected. The representatives shall attend and participate in the meetings of the insurance committee.

10. Administration.

- A. The Risk Management Division shall provide services under this Agreement, including but not limited to, risk management consulting, loss prevention and control centralized loss reporting, actuarial consulting, claims adjusting, the acquisition of legal defense services, and other administrative services as deemed necessary.
- B. The Board shall receive and act upon reports of the Risk Management Division.
- C. The Risk Management Division shall act upon each claim asserting covered occurrences under this Agreement. The Board shall delegate claims settlement authority to the Risk Manager subject to monetary limits beyond which a proposed settlement must be referred to the Board for approval.
- D. The Board may either directly or through a committee require that the Risk Management Division review, audit, report upon, and make recommendations with regard to safety, loss prevention and administrative functions insofar as such matters affect the liability or potential liability of any self-insurance program.
- E. The Board shall receive and review periodic reports and audits of the funds under this Agreement as required by Sections 12 and 13. The Board shall have such other powers and functions as are provided for in this Agreement, any other duly executed Agreements of the Board and in applicable law.



11. Development, Funding and Implementation of Self-insurance Programs.

A. Program Coverage

Self-insurance programs may provide coverages for 1) comprehensive general liability, 2) comprehensive automobile liability, 3) medical malpractice liability, 4) property and related programs, and 5) workers' compensation, and may provide for any other coverages authorized by the Board. Each self-insurance program shall be subject to all terms, conditions, exclusions, and limitations provided in the memorandum of coverage for that program.

B. Program Funding

The parties participating in any self-insurance program hereunder shall fund all costs of that program including administrative and legal costs as hereinafter provided. Administrative and legal costs shall be equitably allocated among the various programs and shall be funded by the parties participating in such programs in accordance with such allocation as hereinafter provided.

C. Annual Premium

Except as provided in Section 19 below, all costs of each self-insurance program shall be funded by annual premiums charged to the parties participating in the program each fiscal year and by interest earnings on the funds so accumulated. Such premiums shall be determined upon the basis of a cost allocation plan and rating formula developed by the Risk Management Division and/or actuarial services with the assistance of a casualty actuary, risk management consultant or other qualified person or persons. The premium for each participating party shall include that party's share of expected losses, reinsurance costs if any, administrative costs, and legal costs for the year for each program in which the party participates.

D. Premium Surcharge

If a program experiences an unusually large loss or losses during a policy year, such that notwithstanding reinsurance coverage, if any, the joint insurance fund for the program may in the opinion of the Risk Manager be exhausted before the next annual premiums are due, the Risk Manager may, after consultation with a casualty actuary or Risk Management consultant, or other qualified person(s), impose premium surcharges upon all parties participating in the program, the total of which will assure adequate funds for the payment of all such losses, provided that, unless necessary to meet current expenses, the surcharge assessed against any party shall not exceed an amount equal to three times the party's annual projected premium for that year.



E. Program Implementation and Effective Date

Following development of a self-insurance program and upon its adoption by the Board of Supervisors, the Risk Management Division shall give each party a written notice of the program which shall include: the coverage to be provided, the minimum number of parties required for program implementation and the estimated first year premium to parties for program participation. Each party may elect to enter the program by giving written notice of such election in a form prescribed by the Risk Management Division.

12. Accounts and Records:

A. Funds and Accounts

There shall be maintained such funds and accounts as may be required by the Board of Supervisors, or the Risk Management Division. Separate funds and accounts shall be established and maintained for each self-insurance program. Books and records shall be open to inspection at reasonable times by authorized representatives of the parties. The County shall adhere to the standard of strict accountability for funds set forth in Government Code Section 6505.

B. Self-insurance Fund Report

Within 180 days after the close of each fiscal year, a written report of all financial activities for such fiscal year shall be presented by the Risk Management Division to the Board of Supervisors and to each party.

13. Responsibilities for Funds and Property.

- A. The Risk Management Division shall have custody of and disbursement authority within the limits established by the Board for funds held under this Agreement. It may delegate dispersing authority to such persons as may be authorized by the Board of Supervisors to perform that function subject to requirements of B. below.
- B. Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505.5 the County Treasurer shall 1) receive and acknowledge receipt of all funds generated under this Agreement; 2) be responsible upon his or her official bond for the safekeeping and disbursement of all such funds so held by him or her; 3) pay any sum due under this Agreement as approved for payment by the Board or persons to whom the Board has delegated approval authority, by making such payments from the funds received under this Agreement upon warrants drawn by the Auditor; 4) verify and report in writing to the Board and to the parties 180 days after the end of the fiscal year the amount of money then held pursuant to this Agreement, the amount of receipts



since the last report, and the amount paid out since the last report.

C. The Board shall secure or cause to be secured a fidelity bond or bonds, in the amount or amounts and in the form specified by the Board covering all officers and staff who are authorized to hold or disperse funds under this Agreement and all officers and staff who are authorized to have charge of, handle and have access to property acquired pursuant to this Agreement.

14. Administration of Claims.

- A. The Risk Management Division shall be responsible for the investigation, settlement or defense and appeal of any claim made, suit brought, or proceeding instituted, arising out of a loss covered by a self-insurance program under this Agreement in which the affected party is a participant.
- B. The Risk Management Division may develop and implement standards for the administration of claims for each self-insured program under this Agreement subject to Board approval.

15. New Members.

After the effective date of this Agreement, the Board may amend this Agreement to add any other special districts, agencies, or commissions under its jurisdiction as parties to this Agreement. Independent fire protection districts as defined in this Agreement may become parties to this Agreement upon the approval of the Board and execution of this Agreement. Any party to this Agreement may participate in any self-insurance program offered under this Agreement subject to approval of the Risk Manager.

16. Withdrawal.

- A. A party may withdraw as a party to this Agreement by giving 30 days advance written notice to the Risk Management Division at the address shown in Section 24, if it has withdrawn from all self-insurance programs in which it was a participant pursuant to B. below.
- B. After becoming a participant in a self-insurance program, a party may withdraw from that program only at the end of a fiscal year for the program and only if it gives the Risk Management Division not less than 90 days advance written notice of such action, and subject to such party's meeting any conditions necessary to provide for present and future loss coverage.




17. Termination of Participation.

- A. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Board may, by majority vote of the Board members present and voting, terminate a party's continued participation in any or all of the self-insurance programs under this Agreement. The Board shall give 90 days' advance written notice of the effective date of any termination under this provision. Upon such effective date, the party shall be treated as if it had voluntarily withdrawn from this Agreement or from the program as the case may be.
- B. A party that does not participate in one or more self-insurance programs under this Agreement within the party's first year as a party shall be deemed to have withdrawn as a party to this Agreement at the end of such one year period.
- C. A party which withdraws from all self-insurance programs in which it was a participant and does not enter any program for a period of six months thereafter shall be deemed to have withdrawn as a party to this Agreement at the end of such six month period.

18. Effective Date of Withdrawal or Cancellation.

- A. If a party's participation in a self-insurance program is terminated with or without termination of the party's participation in this Agreement and such termination is effective before the end of the policy year for that program, subject to the provisions of Section 18.B., the Auditor-Controller shall promptly determine and return to the member the amount of any unearned premium payment for the policy year, such amount to be computed on a prorata basis from the effective date of cancellation. Except as so provided, a party which withdraws from this Agreement or from any self-insurance program under this Agreement shall not be entitled to return of any premium, other payment, or any property contributed under this Agreement.
- B. Notwithstanding withdrawal or termination from any self-insurance program of the Authority, a party shall pay any premium charges which the Board determines are due from the party for losses and costs during the period in which the party was a participant in such program. Such charges may include any deficiency in a premium previously paid by the party as determined by an audit, any premium surcharge assessed to the party under Section 11.D and any additional amount of premium which the Board determines to be due from the member upon final disposition of all claims arising from losses under the program during the member's period of participation. Any such premium charges shall be payable by the member within 30 days of the billing.



19. <u>Liability of County Board Members, Officers, Employees, and Committee Members.</u>

The parties hereto shall defend, indemnify, save, and hold harmless the County, its officers, and employees from any and all claims, costs, and liability for any damages, sickness, death, or injury to person(s) or property, including without limitation all consequential damages, from any cause whatsoever arising directly or indirectly from or connected with the programs, operations or services under this Agreement, save and except claims or litigation arising through the negligence or willful misconduct of the County or its officers or employees. The parties will reimburse the County for any expenditures, including reasonable attorneys fees, the County may make by reason of the matters that are subject of this indemnification, and if requested by the County will defend any claims or litigation to which this indemnification provision applies at the sole cost and expense of the other parties, provided however, nothing herein shall relieve the County from any obligations it may have under this section by virtue of its status as a party to this Agreement.

20. Amendment.

Except as provided in Section 15 "New Members", this Agreement may be amended at any time by a subsequent written Agreement of the parties.

21. Prohibition Against Assignment.


No party may assign any right, claim or interest it may have under this Agreement and no creditor, assignee or third party beneficiary of any member shall have any right to claim for title to any part, share, interest, fund, premium or asset contributed under this Agreement.

22. Agreement Complete.

This Agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. Except as expressly provided herein, no other understanding, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind the parties hereto.

23. Effective Date of Amendment.

Any amendment of this Agreement shall become effective upon the approval of any amended Agreement by the Board.



24. Notices.

All notices provided for by this Agreement (including but not limited to, notice of claims, lawsuits, and fund and account inquiries) shall be in writing and delivered by deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid. Notices to the County or Risk Management Division shall be sent to:

Notices to any party hereto not governed by the Board of Supervisors shall be sent to the last known address on file with the Risk Management Division. The effective date of notice shall be the date of deposit in the mails or of other delivery, except that the effective date of notice to the County shall be the date of receipt by the Risk Management Division.

25. Regulations.

The Risk Manager is authorized to adopt regulations to implement this Agreement.

26. Choice of Law.

This Agreement is made in Contra Costa County and shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any action relating to this Agreement shall be instituted and prosecuted in the courts of Contra Costa County.

27. Counterparts.

This Agreement and any supplement or amendment hereto may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall for all purposes be deemed to be an original and all of which shall together constitute but one and the same instrument.

MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 26, 2011 FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

PRESENT:

CALL TO ORDER:

Director Kosel called the meeting to order at 12:00 noon and noted those present.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

None.

COMMITTEE MINUTES OF MAY 25, 2010:

Director Kosel requested that "actuarial" be changed to "actuary" on page 2, line 10. The Committee agreed by consensus to adopt the May 25, 2010 minutes as amended.

REVIEW AND RECOMMEND DRAFT FY09-10 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

The Committee discussed pages 4, 15 and 16 in regard to information on the PERS Trust and suggested changes to the narrative on page 16. The PERS Trust is nearly 100% funded at this time; the balance of 9/30/10 is \$1,525,000. The District will probably start using the trust to pay for the medical benefits during FY11-12. The District had budgeted \$50,000 to contribute during FY10-11 because it had not received the 2010 actuary report at that time. It is not necessary to contribute the amount that was budgeted. The actuary report will be updated again in 2011 per PERS schedule. The Committee noted a change that needs to be made to pages 3 and 7 regarding outdated information about a long-term note receivable. Staff addressed several questions on the District's operations. The revised financial statements will be on the Board's February agenda.

MID-YEAR BUDGET VS. ACTUAL REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Committee reviewed the Budget vs. Actual report for the first half of the FY10-11 fiscal year. Overall, the District is on track and no adjustments need to be made. Russell gave an explanation on how the health benefit line items have to tie to the actuary report. The District did receive 1% more in property taxes than was budgeted. The budget amount was extremely conservative due to the current economy and housing market.

Navellier informed the Committee that there are two areas in Kensington that EBMUD is currently studying that have low flow and they may be potential upcoming projects for KFPD. The Committee asked for an update from the Chief at the February meeting.

REVIEW OF DISTRICT BUILDING COSTS:

The Committee discussed the current status of the proposed construction cost that is budgeted for the 2010-11 fiscal year. The Committee discussed the construction management firm's role and if they should have updated the prequalification vetting prior to bidding. They are currently under contract through pre-construction only.

Staff handed out a draft compilation of costs association with building maintenance and remodels since the El Cerrito contract started. The building is old and is on the Hayward fault line which causes quite a bit of movement. Many years ago, the District discussed relocating but there are few choices and much public opinion. The numbers prior to 2001 were pulled from audits that had very little detail at that time. The total cost to maintain the building has been nearly \$100,000 per year. In the past 15 years the District has spent \$1.4 million and KPPCSD has contributed \$223,000 of that. The Committee suggested some format changes. Staff will email an updated version to the Committee members.

ELECTED BOARD MEMBERSHIP

Public Service or Public Employment?

SUMMARY

Given the difficult economic challenges facing local government, the Contra Costa County Grand Jury conducted a survey about compensation for elected Special District Boards (Board) and City Councils (Council). The Grand Jury looked at the use of funds and if the total amounts spent by these agencies for elected officials' compensation seemed reasonable.

The study revealed significant compensation disparities among elected Boards and Councils within Contra Costa County (County).

For example, while Martinez and Oakley both have similar populations of about 35,000 residents, the Martinez City Council total compensation is \$131,326, while Oakley's is only \$28,544.

San Ramon with 60,000 residents pays \$163,190 to its entire Council while Pittsburg, with slightly more residents, pays its Council \$40,035.

Richmond and Antioch, both with around 100,000 residents, pay their entire Councils \$267,139 and \$112, 591 respectively.

The Grand Jury recognizes those agencies that pay nothing or minimum compensation and thus demonstrate the spirit of public service.

At the same time, there are a large number of Boards and Councils that are being compensated amounts which may be viewed as exorbitant. Board and Council members are elected to serve their constituents. They set policy, oversee programs and services administered by professional employees and are accountable to the public for their actions.

The Grand Jury believes the public should be aware of the compensation paid to their elected officials, what benefits are provided and whether the compensation structure indicates that the spirit of public service has changed to an entitlement of public employment.

BACKGROUND

County residents are living in very difficult economic times, in which both public agencies and individuals have had to cut spending.

The Grand Jury surveyed all 19 cities in the County as well as the 27 largest independent special districts that have their own publicly elected Boards of Directors. Population information for the analysis was obtained from Local Agency Formation Commission reports. The survey collected data for Fiscal Years (FY) 2008-09 and 2009-10.

Information was requested for the following categories pertaining to annual expenditures for elected officials: salary and/or meeting fees, health care insurance costs, pension or deferred compensation, life insurance premiums, car allowance or mileage, cell phone and/or internet access and travel & conference costs.

The total amount spent county-wide in FY 2009-10 on compensation for the surveyed Boards and Councils was \$2,419,169.

The following data is grouped by cities and special districts. Data reported are the total amounts for each Board or Council regardless of the number of elected members. All cities have five elected Council members with the exception of Richmond, which has seven. All special districts have five Board members except the Byron-Bethany Irrigation District, which has nine, with two vacancies.

Cities

- The average annual amount spent for each Council was \$77,895.
- Lafayette, Moraga and Orinda had minimal expenses for their elected leaders.
- Eight cities compensate their elected leaders more than the average for all surveyed. These cities spent an average of \$136,145. Of that amount, 76.4% was paid for salary and/or meeting fees and health care benefits. See table below.
- Twelve cities pay for elected officials' pensions or other forms of retirement benefits.
- Twelve cities pay for elected officials' health care insurance costs.
- Eight cities pay life insurance premiums for elected officials.
- Six cities pay for elected officials' cell phone or internet access.

- The average annual amount spent for each Board was \$34,784.
- Nine special districts paid their elected leaders from zero to less than \$100 in total. They are: Crockett Community Services District, Diablo Community Services District, Kensington Police Protection & Community Services District, Town of Knightsen Community Services District, Kensington Fire Protection District, Rodeo-Hercules Fire Protection District, Bethel Island Municipal Improvement District, Green Valley Recreation and Park District, and Moraga-Orinda Fire District.

- Eight special districts compensate their elected officials more than the average for all surveyed. These districts spent an average of \$99,089. Of that amount 87.7% was paid for salary and/or meeting fees and health care insurance costs. See the table below.
- Eight out of the nine most generous special districts are water or wastewater providers that pass on their costs to rate payers.
- Three special districts contribute to pension or other form of retirement benefits for one or more elected officials.

Contra Costa Water District reported no pensions paid but has a provision in their retirement plan to pay a pension for Board members at age 62 after 10 years of service.

Professional full-time managers are hired to run each agency. Historically, elected officials have looked upon their work as public service for the betterment of the community. Agencies have provided their elected leaders with benefits. These include health care insurance, employer paid retirement benefits, life insurance premiums, payments for cell phone/internet access, and mileage reimbursement or car allowance.

The total dollar amounts are small in relation to agency overall budgets. However, services to the public are being reduced in most agencies which usually means staff reductions. Although service reductions have been implemented, governing boards have continued to enjoy the same level of benefits. They should demonstrate their leadership by eliminating or reducing benefits.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Each agency named needs to respond only for its own practices.

Finding # 1: Sixteen cities and eighteen special districts provide benefits to their elected leaders in some fashion. These benefits may include salary, meeting fees, health care insurance costs, pension or deferred compensation, life insurance premiums, cell phone usage, and internet connections.

Recommendation #1: All cities and special districts should conduct an annual public review of compensation provided to their respective elected Councils and Boards. This review should include such items as salary, meeting fees, health care insurance costs, pension/deferred compensation, life insurance premiums, cell phone usage, and internet connections. The public review should address whether or not changes in compensation are warranted.

Finding # 2: Eight cities spend more than the county-wide average (\$39,377) for salary and meeting fees. They are: Antioch, Concord, Danville, Hercules, Martinez, Richmond, San Pablo and San Ramon.

Recommendation # 2: These cities, as part of the annual review in Recommendation 1, should consider whether it would be appropriate to implement reductions of salary and meeting fee expenditures to bring them in line with other cities.

Finding #3: Eight special districts spend more than the county-wide average (\$13,313) for salary and meeting fees. They are: Central Contra Costa Sanitary District, Contra Costa Water District, Discovery Bay Community Services District, Ironhouse Sanitary District, Los Medanos Community Healthcare District, Mt. View Sanitary District, Stege Sanitary District and West County Wastewater District.

Recommendation # 3: These special districts, as part of the annual review in Recommendation 1, should consider whether it would be appropriate to implement a

reduction of salary and meeting fee expenditures to bring them in line with other special districts.

Finding # 4: Health care benefits are provided to elected Board members by twelve cities and nine special districts.

Recommendation # 4: The policy of paying health care insurance costs for Council and Board members should be reviewed to determine whether this practice is appropriate. The agencies following this practice are:

Cities: Antioch, Brentwood, Concord, Danville, Hercules, Martinez, Pinole, Pittsburg, Pleasant Hill, Richmond, San Pablo and San Ramon.

Special Districts: Byron-Bethany Irrigation District, Central Contra Costa Sanitary District, Contra Costa Water District, East Contra Costa Irrigation District, Ironhouse Sanitary District, Mt. Diablo Healthcare District, Mt. View Sanitary District, West Contra Costa Healthcare District and West County Wastewater District.

Finding # 5: Pension benefits, with potential long-term financial implications for the agency, are provided to Council and Board members by twelve cities and three special districts.

Recommendation #5: The policy of paying pension or deferred compensation for Council and Board members should be reviewed to determine whether this practice is appropriate. The agencies following this practice are:

Cities: Antioch, Brentwood, Clayton, Concord, Danville, El Cerrito, Hercules, Martinez, Pleasant Hill, San Pablo, San Ramon and Walnut Creek.

Special Districts: Central Contra Costa Sanitary District, Ironhouse Sanitary District and West County Wastewater District.
